Bumblebees have a fuzzy coat to protect them from frosty spring mornings and evenings.

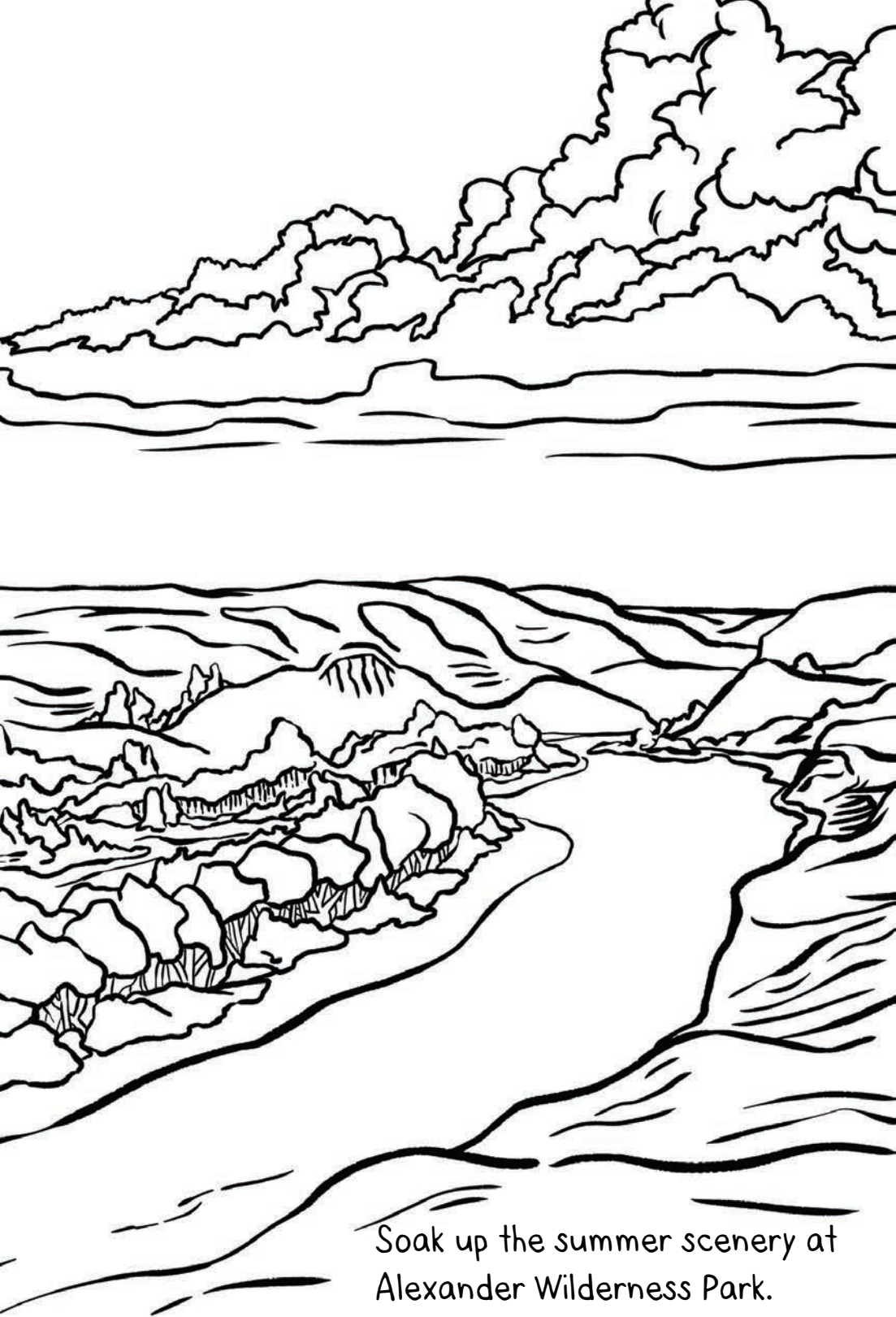


Bumblebees are  
natural rock stars.



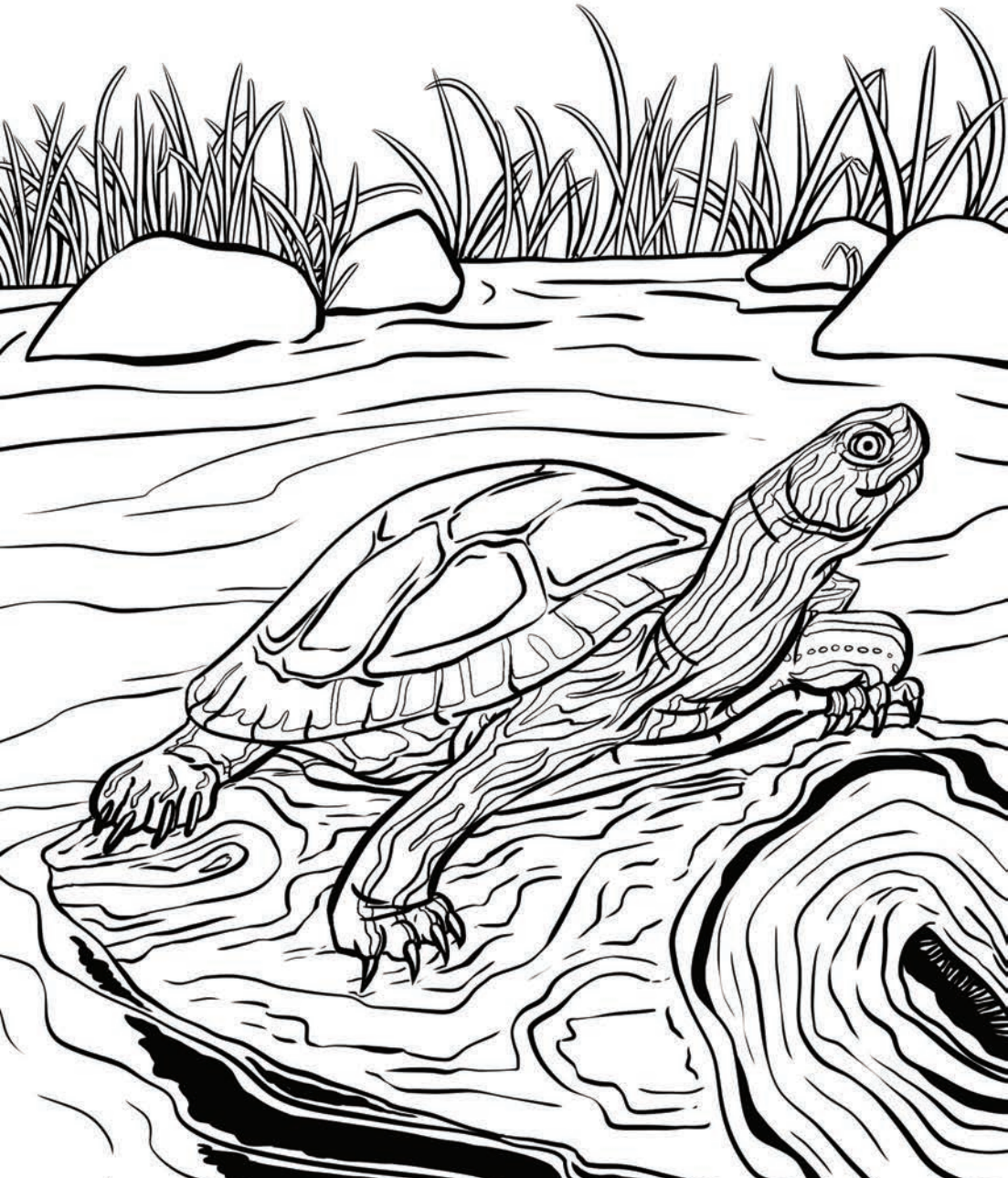
Their super long tongues help them

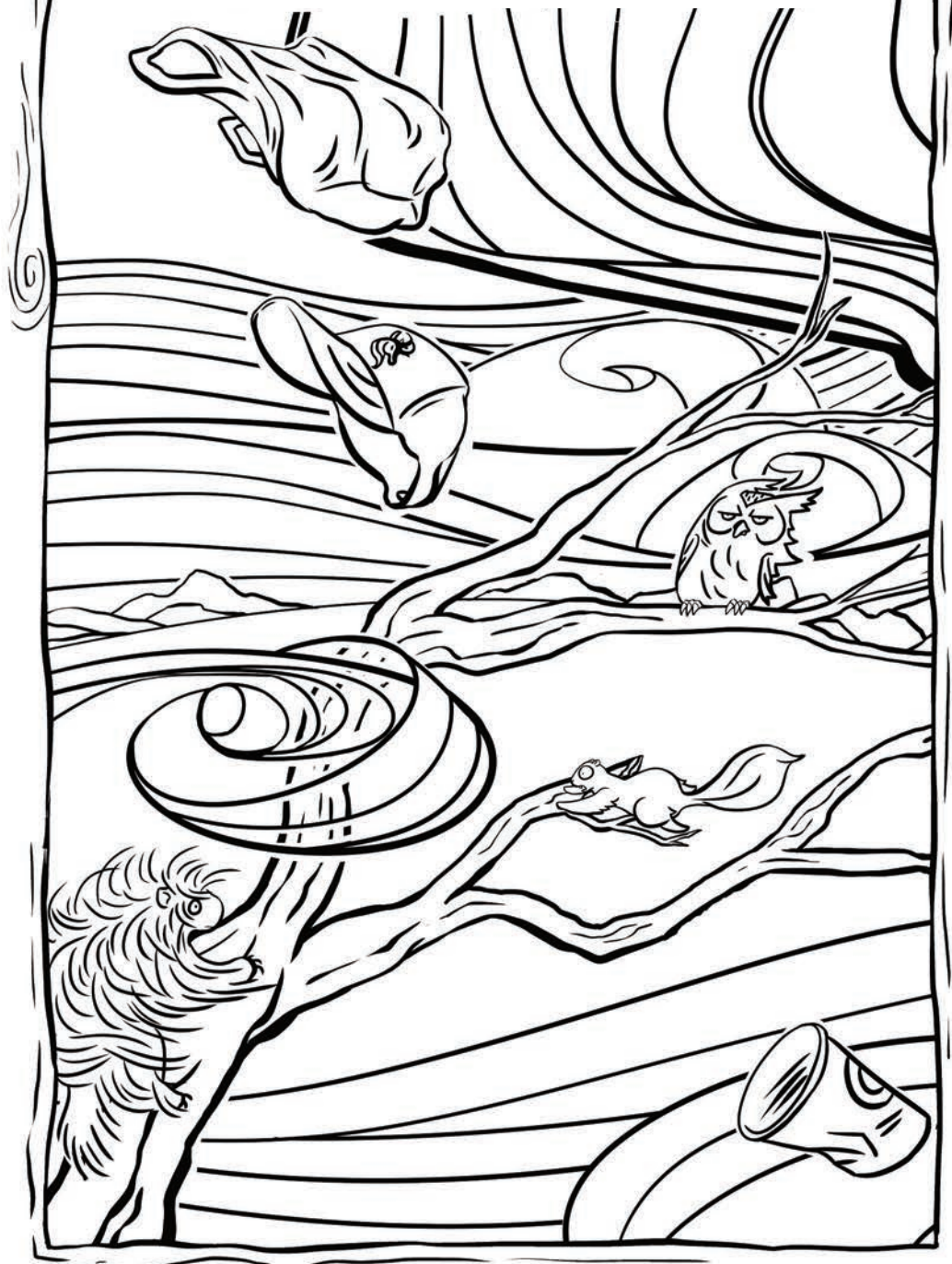
